HISTORY (1/3)



<u>2007</u>: Community members identified a need for preparedness after the "Great Gale of 2007"

<u>2009</u>: Transfer switch installed in the Barbara Bennett Community Center <u>2010</u>: First emergency preparedness presentations and trainings offered to the community (CERT, CPR, and more)

2011: Map Your Neighborhood (MYN) Project Initiated

2012: Cape Meares Community Association (CMCA) establishes an emergency preparedness committee ● First Cape Meares Tsunami Drill

Evacuation trails identified ● Five tsunami evacuation routes identified by CMCA and Tillamook County ● Cape Meares tsunami evacuation map posted at beach parking lot; trainings and presentations
 2013: CMCA Emergency Preparedness Committee looks outward – meets with County Representatives, other community leaders
 2014: CMCA becomes a 501(c)3 in part to facilitate CMCA Emergency Preparedness grantmaking efforts; trainings and presentations
 2015: First TPUD Community Support Grant Award - funds the first emergency supply shed (7th ST NW); trainings and presentations

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HISTORY (2/3)



<u>2016</u>: Major CMCA fundraising campaign to build additional supply sheds; training and presentations

2017: CMCA joins the Tillamook County Citizens Corps (TC4) ● trainings and presentations ● CMCA participates in the Great American Shakeout Drill

<u>2018:</u> CMCA receives a \$10,000 Grant Award – Homeland Security Grant (sub-award) - partnership with Tillamook Fire and Rescue - funds used to build second supply shed (3rd ST NW) and stock both sheds; trainings and presentations

<u>2019</u>: Development/deployment of Well-Prepared Neighborhood Checklist; trainings and presentations

<u>2020</u>: Fundraising for a third shed continues; collaboration with Netarts and Oceanside; trainings and presentations

<u>2021</u>: CMCA installs 3rd Supply Shed – end of 9th Street through community fundraising and volunteer hours; trainings and presentations

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HISTORY (3/3)



2022-2023: Activities severely curtailed due to the COVID Pandemic 2024: CMCA identifies a Grant-making Lead ● Two grants submitted (TPUD, OREM Resilience Networks and Resilience Hubs Grant) ● CMCA receives a 2024 TPUD Community Support Grant Program Award ● CMCA changes EP Committee name to the Cape Meares Emergency Volunteer Corps (CMEVC)





VISION=Resilience

The capacity to thrive during and after an emergency that involves an unknown event with an unknown timeframe and for an unknown number of people

MISSION (Purpose)

To maintain a culture of preparedness in the Cape Meares community so that we are always ready to deliver an effective mass-care response regardless of the emergency including power outages, flooding, landslides, wildfires, earthquakes, and tsunamis





GOAL

To maximize positive outcomes for all survivors before, during, and after an emergency

FRAMEWORK

- Assessing and Mitigating Community Risk –
 incorporate changes, policy updates into
 planning, execution
- Fostering a Culture of Preparedness that helps keep our diverse community informed, aware, and engaged
- Building and Sustaining a CMCA Mass-Care Infrastructure that is informed by ongoing risk assessment
- Practicing and Refining the CMCA Mass-Care Emergency Operations Plan adapts to the type of emergency faced by the community
- Leveraging the Support of the CMCA Board and CMCA Development Function (fundraising and grant-making
